INTERFAITH COMMUNITY QUILT GOES ON THE MOVE IN NORTH KIRKLEES

Kirklees interfaith week in November 2022 addressed the theme of 'Home'. Hannah McKerchar, Humanist rep on Kirklees SACRE, proposed the idea of making a community quilt based on people's perceptions of 'Home'. The finished quilt is beautiful, with handmade panels representing and celebrating the diversity of the community. Following a few weeks in Huddersfield Parish Church, it is now on display in Batley Library. The next stop will be Longcauseway Church in Dewsbury; it is hoped that as many people as possible will take the opportunity to go and look at it.



During Interfaith week, nearly 2000 primary pupils from Kirklees, Leeds and Calderdale reflected on the theme of 'Home' by participating in an online conference to learn about how Christians, Jews, Hindus and Muslims practise their faith at home. Older pupils were given the opportunity to meet members of faith communities who have come from other countries and made their home in the UK. One teacher commented that this was 'a lovely, thoughtful day with lots of learning and time to reflect.'

CENSUS DATA 2021 SHOWS CHANGING ATTITUDES TO RELIGION

The results of the religion questions from the 2021 Census were released at the end of November and there has been plenty of comment and interest from RE organisations and leaders. Here is a selection:

Following the publication of the 2021 census results relating to religion and belief, Culham St Gabriel's Trust wanted to understand how parents view their children's religious education. Their survey into attitudes among parents has found that religious and philosophical themes are a major talking point at home between parents and their children:

- Around 8 in 10 discuss beliefs about the origins of life and the universe (78%)
- Around 7 in 10 discuss beliefs concerning what happens when we die (72%)
- Around 8 in 10 discuss beliefs that affect people's behaviour and decision making (77%)
- Around 7 in 10 discuss issues related to religious and non-religious worldviews that appear in the media (67%)

FREE SELF-STUDY SHORT COURSES ON RELIGION AND WORLDVIEWS

FARMINGTON SCHOLARSHIPS FOR TEACHERS AND HEADTEACHERS

Farmington Scholarships for research in RE cover the cost of tuition, essential local travel and, by negotiation with the school, the salary of a replacement teacher. Scholarships last for a maximum of 30 days and can either be taken at a local university or can be home-based with a local tutor.
